Cemetery News

The days are getting shorter, the leaves are starting to fall, the weather is getting cooler and our thoughts turn to cleaning and sprucing up and preparing for winter. We should not neglect our cemetery! Those who have loved ones interred in our cemetery should take a trip to Assumption Cemetery and clean up the dead flowers and debris that has accumulated from your summer planting. Removing the debris, dead flowers, artificial flowers, etc. will help our groundskeeper with his initial task of fertilizing and lawn cutting early next spring and make it much easier for him to trim around the headstones later in the year. All of this is done to make your cemetery look clean and beautiful.

Another deterrent to our cemetery's appearance is the large amount of overgrown shrubs, bushes, and small trees that are placed in front of the memorial stones. Not only do they detract from the appearance of the cemetery; they impede the work of the grounds-keeper from trimming neatly around your loved ones resting place. Some shrubs, bushes, and trees are so overgrown that you cannot identify the marker unless you pull back the branches. If these items are not properly and neatly maintained, they will be removed next year. Remember this is your cemetery. We are certain that all of us want a neat and clean place for the repose of the remains of our loved ones. Please make every effort to help us maintain the cemetery grounds.
