# **TODAY: Twenty Fourth Sunday after Pentecost**

On this Sunday Our Lord comes to the land of the possessed; there, He is neither idle, nor passive, nor absent: He acts, He heals the possessed man; and what happens, what is the response of the people? They are in terror because they have seen the power of God manifested in such a way that fills them with fear, not with awe. And they ask Christ to be gone: Leave our realm, go away! The fact that Christ has acted, that He has healed, that He has saved the man, matters nothing; what matters, is that they have to pay the cost for it: their pigs...

Isn't it again something which we happen to do? We ask God to come into our lives; and suddenly we discover that God is not coming in the way in which we want Him to be! He is not coming into our lives simply to order things according to our view; He transforms the dead orderliness of our life into a chaos, but a chaos which is loaded with possibilities - but we don't want this! We want what we had: an orderly life, without problems, without anything great happening, also without anything tragic happening. Who are we on this Sunday my dearly beloved: People who welcome Christ into our lives or the Gadarenes?

### St. Josaphat Seminary Celebration

This year, our Archeparchy is celebrating the 75th anniversary of the establishment of Saint Josaphat Ukrainian Catholic Seminary, our major seminary. On September 8, 1941, Bishop Bohachevsky began a seminary in rented apartments on Lincoln Road, NE, Washington, DC. Soon thereafter, in 1952, the present St. Josaphat Ukrainian Catholic Seminary was built at the top of the hill of Harewood Road and Taylor Street, NE, near The Catholic University of America. It was completely updated and renovated in 2004.

ALL are invited to the celebration. The Hierarchical Divine Liturgy begins on Sunday, November 13, 2016, at 10:30 a.m. at the Ukrainian Catholic National Shrine of the Holy Family located next to the seminary at 4250 Harewood Road NE, Washington, DC, 20017. A reception will follow in the lower hall.

Our St. Josaphat Ukrainian Catholic Seminary has been a hope-filled seminary for the spiritual and academic formation of priests and bishops for our Church. Over 145 priests have graduated, among them 10 hierarchs, including our previous Major-Archbishop Lubomyr Cardinal Husar. We ask your prayers for continued success in providing for the pastoral needs of our Ukrainian Catholic Church in the United States.

#### ASK THE PRIEST: What is the 40th Day

Commemoration-Memorial for the Departed?

In the Eastern Church it is customary to remember our departed brothers and sisters in a special way on the fortieth day after their death. We recall that after Christ our Savior rose from the dead, destroying death and conquering Hades, He appeared on many occasions to His disciples, especially to "the eleven," i.e. the holy Apostles. On the fortieth day He called them to the holy mountain, commissioned them to "Baptize all nations", and to forgive sins through the Sacrament of Confession. Then, before their very eyes, He was taken up bodily into heaven where He is "enthroned at the right hand of the Father." His last words to us were: "Behold, I am with you always - even to the end of the ages."

Recalling His glorious Resurrection and the fulfillment of His promise to remain with us through the Holy Church, the same Church calls us, after forty days, to put off mourning. At the end of the Divine Liturgy, the priest leads the faithful in prayers for the forgiveness of the sins of the departed servant(s) of God, and asks the Lord to admit his or her soul into the heavenly mansions.
