Relics of Ukrainian Martyr in our Parish

From as early as anyone can tell, Christians preserved the bones and other relics of saints and martyrs. That may appear to be an odd practice, but remember that in the Old Testament a dead man came back to life when his body was put in the grave of the Prophet Elisha and touched his bones. God worked many miracles through the touch of the hands of the Apostles in Acts—and even through the aprons and handkerchiefs of St. Paul and the shadow of St. Peter. In each of these instances God has brought about a healing using a material object. The vehicle for the healing was the touching of that object. It is very important to note, however, that the cause of the healing is God; the relics are a means through which He acts. In other words, relics are not magic. They do not contain a power that is their own; a power separate from God. Any good that comes about through a relic is God's doing. But the fact that God chooses to use the relics of saints to work healing and miracles tells us that He wants to draw our attention to the saints as "models and intercessors" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 828).

This week until Friday, March 10, we will host the relic and an icon of Blessed Bishop-Martyr Mykola Charnetsky for special veneration. Blessed Bishop-Martyr Charnetsky, known as "*the healer of souls*" was beatified by St. John Paul II on June 27, 2001 in Lviv, Ukraine. Many personal testimonies are recorded of miraculous healings through his intercession. All the faithful are invited and encouraged to attend this service and to bring their intentions for healing through the intercession of Blessed Bishop Mykola. A special Moleben Prayer and Healing Service before a relic of the martyr will be held in our parish on Thursday, Mar. 9th at 6:30 pm. After the service the faithful will be anointed with the holy oil of healing.

"Bitter Harvest" Movie

The film, "Bitter Harvest" opened in theatres throughout the United States on Friday, February 24. Set between the two World Wars and based on true historical events, BITTER HARVEST conveys the tragic story of the Holodomor, the genocidal famine engineered by the tyrant Joseph Stalin that resulted in the starvation of 7-10 million Ukrainians. The film displays a powerful tale of love, honour, rebellion and survival at a time when Ukraine was forced to adjust to the horrifying territorial ambitions of the burgeoning Soviet Union. With an exceptional cast of established and rising stars, the film epically recreates one of the most dramatic and dangerous episodes in the history of 20th Century Europe.

Set in 1930's Ukraine, as Stalin advances the ambitions of communists in the Kremlin, young artist Yuri battles to save his lover Natalka from the Holodomor, the death-by-starvation program that ultimately killed millions of Ukrainians. I am kindly asking you to attend a screening in a local movie theatre. Please go to www.fandango.com and look for the closest theater to you where this movie is shown. In a certain sense, we have a special obligation to support those who invested their time, talents and resources to create and share this tragic story with the world. If we do not support these efforts in telling this tragic story of our Ukrainian people, who will?
