The End of the Year

Questions about Our Faith

• What exactly is a Deacon and how is he different from a Priest?

Deacons are ordained members of the Clergy who are beneath the priest in the Church hierarchy. All priests and bishops are ordained as deacons before being further ordained as a priest or bishop. In that case they are called *"transitional deacons."*

Permanent Deacons are those men ordained as deacons but who do not plan to move on to the priesthood. Permanent Deacons can be married if they were married at the time of ordination, but are normally not allowed to marry again (if their wife dies). Deacons can do pretty much what a priest can do, except they cannot say Liturgy or do the Consecration. They cannot hear confession, and they are not allowed to anoint the sick (since that may involve confession).

The traditional garb of the Deacon is an alb (a white robe) with a stole that goes over the left shoulder (as opposed to the Priest's stole which goes over both shoulders).

\cdot What does the Catholic Church mean by Sacred Tradition?

Sacred Tradition are those practices and beliefs that were passed down by the apostles to us. Some of Sacred Tradition is contained in the Bible, but some of it is not. For instance, the belief in the Holy Trinity is a Sacred Tradition which is not defined in the Bible.

The Gospels and the Epistles of the New Testament were written somewhere between 50 AD - 100 AD. These were not officially put together as Canon until the 4th Century, and were finally confirmed by the 2nd Council of Carthage in 419 AD. That was the birth of the New Testament that we know today. During the time prior to the New Testament Canon, the Church was maintained through oral traditions and practices which we call Sacred Traditions and which we practice to this day.
