**Today, Sunday: Parable of the Rich Man**

'Whose will those things be which you have provided?' is the key to understanding the saving up of material goods. St. John Chrysostom writes that the only barns we need we already have: "the stomachs of the poor." St. Ambrose teaches, "The things which we cannot take with us are not ours. Only virtue will be our companion when we die." Even when Joseph stored up grain in Egypt (Gen. 41), it was for the benefit of the whole nation. These teachings apply to parishes as well as to each person. We are rich in material possessions. Let us not be like this rich man in today's Gospel. Let us instead give thanks to God for all that He has given us. Let us use what He has given us to care for His people.

Last Saturday, our parishioners gathered in the church hall to learn about "Heroic Virtues" of the Venerable Metropolitan Andrew Sheptytsky. After the Divine Liturgy, the night was filled with interest, food, and good fellowship. Our parishioner Mrs. Melanie Fedynshyn, prepared and delivered an outstanding presentation about the Venerable Servant of God Andrew Sheptytsky, whose exemplary life and saintly courage demonstrated what it means to be a Good Samaritan and a Good Shepherd for his people. Parishioners also viewed a special exhibit of posters about Andrey Sheptytsky's life, his humanitarian deeds and traveling to the United States. One of the most memorable events in the history of Assumption parish was a visit by Metropolitan Andrey to our parish in December, 1921. He inspired the early parish community to persevere in its mission to establish a strong spiritual home of many Ukrainian Catholics in Perth Amboy. After his visit numerous organizations were founded and plans for the parish school were set for the future.

**Women of the Gulag.**

Last Sunday after the 9:00 a.m. Liturgy, Dr. Oksana Kis, historian and author of "Women of the Gulag" presented a very informative and moving lecture on the incredible hardships Ukrainian women endured in Soviet forced labor camps in the 1940's-50's. Although millions died, many courageous women not only survived but found ways to preserve their culture, gender identity and sense of sisterhood. A testament to the amazing strength of women! **Q&A about Our Faith**

- ***Why do you make the Sign of the Cross backwards?***

The form of the Sign of the Cross was common among Eastern and Western Christians for many centuries: touching the forehead, breast, right shoulder, and left shoulder. In Biblical symbolism, the right represents good. (Think of the Lord Jesus sitting at the right hand of the Father.) The inversion of the sign might have come from imitating the priest, who in blessing moves from left to right so that it can be seen correctly by the congregation before him.

- ***Is it true that your priests can get married?***

No, but qualified married men can be ordained to the diaconate and priesthood. This has been the practice of the Church since the time of the Apostles. The future deacon or priest must already be married before ordination, and his wife must approve.

- ***I saw little children receive Holy Communion at your church. They're too young to know about the Eucharist.***

The practice of baptizing infants and then excommunicating them for seven years is confusing to say the least. Our children have been baptized and confirmed according to the Church's traditional order of the sacraments, and are full members of the Church. Just as parents nurture their children's physical bodies, they also bring them to Holy Communion to nurture the seed of divine life that the children were given at Holy Baptism.
