# Pastor's Corner

Once a child asked me, "Father, can you tell me about the connection with Mary and doors?" This inquiry came during a lesson on the Feast of the Dormition of the Mother of God, which we celebrated in our church last Sunday. This young student heard the name of this feast as the, "Doormition". At first, I chuckled to myself, but then it crossed my mind that there just might be a connection. In the Book of Genesis, we read how Adam and Eve disobeyed God. Their disobedience caused them to be expelled from the Garden. At first glanced, it appeared that the doors were shut for good. Even though this happened, God still had a plan to open the doors once again. He sent his Son, Jesus, to the world to restore creation to its original beauty. In addition to the original beauty of creation, Jesus would also guide the human race back to the original plan, to share eternal life with God.

On the Feast of Dormition of the Mother of God, we remember not only Mary's earthly passing but more importantly that she now shares eternal life fully with God. God also desires that each and every one of us shares fully in eternal life. The journey to this destination may not always be easy. Some doors may be hard to open if they have been damaged by sin. When we feel fear and anxiety on the journey, Mary can greatly help us to open all the doors that will lead to her Son and eternal life. The following is a prayer that is prayed before the start of each Divine Liturgy. Feel free to pray this prayer often before an icon of Mary. "Open unto us the doors of mercy, O blessed Mother of God. Let us not perish who put our trust in you, but rather through you be delivered from misfortune.

#### Question about Our Faith

What does the Catholic phrase "world without end" mean?

Many Catholic prayers in the English language conclude with the phrase, "world without end," or alternatively with, "forever and ever." The "Glory Be" is one prayer that concludes in this way.

The phrase is repeated so much that many Catholics may not even notice it. Yet, for some it is a confusing phrase, especially when considering the idea that world will end, paving the way for a new Heaven and a new Earth.

This phrase is an English translation of the Latin words, "in saecula saeculorum." It appears in the Latin Vulgate a number of times and also has a Greek equivalent in the New

According to A Dictionary of the Bible, the phrase refers to "A certain specified period of the history past or to come ... More frequently it signifies indefinitely long period of time, eternity or to come; 'unto the ages' being equivalent to 'forever' or 'for evermore.'" In Eastern Orthodox prayers it is translated as "unto ages of ages."
