No, They are Not Disposable

Let's face it, men and women were put on this earth, and they are both built differently to produce life - bottom line! We always think of women when it comes to the primary care of a child even in marriage. But there are many instances where women are the breadwinner, and it makes more sense financially for the woman to go to work and the man to stay home and take care of the children.

When I watch YouTube videos, some of the most moving ones are between fathers and their children. There was one particular one when a man was marrying a woman who had a daughter from a previous relationship. Before reciting the wedding vows to his intended wife, he bent down to the little girl, and took her hand and promised to always be by her side to protect, support, and take care of her always. As he was reciting those words, she started to cry and at the end gave him a huge hug around his neck.

I am not ashamed to admit that I get very emotional and tear up from that man pledging the devotion to his new stepdaughter. You don't have to be a biological father to raise a child. I also remember one time watching Steve Harvey who has a show and showcases young children. He was interviewing a little girl and Steve Harvey pointed to a man in the audience, "Is that your father?" She looked at him and sternly corrected him, "NO! THAT'S MY DAD!"

As I stated in a previous editorial, when I was growing up, every boy had a father (figuratively and literally). 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Feast of the Nativity of Saint John the Baptist.

LITURGICAL QUESTIONS:

What is a fundamental difference between the Roman and Byzantine liturgical experiences of bread?

We know, certainly, that the Roman Church uses unleavened bread, while the Byzantine Church uses leavened bread. What has developed is that the Roman priest is able to obtain the bread for the Liturgy from a common source, usually from Church supply companies. It comes pre-packaged and ready to use in a very convenient form.

The Byzantine Church uses leavened bread, that is, bread that is baked with yeast. The bread is usually called prosphora, = "that which is offered." This results in a quite different practice: there are no central altar supply companies for prosphora, and so each parish must make its own bread. I see this as a blessing - for the Eucharist then becomes truly a community concern. Either the priest himself or a designated parishioner must make the bread. It is therefore much more personal.

Our parishioners here at Assumption are blessed to have Mrs. Colette Baginsky who bakes our Prosphora (that which is offered) for Saturday-Sunday Liturgies.
