QUESTIONS About Our Faith:

What is the 40th Day Commemoration-Memorial for the Departed?

In the Eastern Church it is customary to remember our departed brothers and sisters in a special way on the fortieth day after their death. We recall that after Christ our Savior rose from the dead, destroying death and conquering Hades, He appeared on many occasions to His disciples, especially to "the eleven," i.e. the holy Apostles.

On the fortieth day He called them to the holy mountain, commissioned them to "Baptize all nations", and to forgive sins through the Sacrament of Confession. Then, before their very eyes, He was taken up bodily into heaven where He is "enthroned at the right hand of the Father." His last words to us were: "Behold, I am with you always even to the end of the ages."

Recalling His glorious Resurrection and the fulfillment of His promise to remain with us through the Holy Church, the same Church calls us, after forty days, to put off mourning. At the end of the Divine Liturgy, the priest leads the faithful in prayers for the forgiveness of the sins of the departed servant(s) of God, and asks the Lord to admit his or her soul into the heavenly mansions.

Why Do We Light Candles?

In Christianity, lighting candles is a significant act of prayer and worship. Candles symbolize the light of Christ, and lighting them signifies a person's prayer request, devotion, and our sacrifice. In olden days, people made their own candles. Some had a bees hive at home. Candles were made from pure wax then, without any mixtures. Bees were thought of almost like saints, because of their purity.

When we light the candle before an icon and say a prayer for someone; we tell God that we are praying for that person and as long as our candle burns our prayer will be there before God. We say to our friends who are sick or troubled that we will light a candle for them. We light candles for someone who has died. Sometimes we light a candle to say "thank you" to God. In some churches people kiss the candle before lighting it.
