Holy Tradition vs. Local Customs in Catholic Churches.

In our Church there are those things which belong to "Holy Tradition" and those things which are simply "traditions" (or, perhaps, better called "customs"). In essential matters—doctrine, sacraments, worship, etc.—there are no differences. In minor things—the style of vestments, the exact order of services, customs associated with various feast days—there is a wide variety of customs which may be found, as developed in various times and various places based on a wide variety of circumstances. Furthermore, these customs are not, nor were they ever intended to be, that which brings about unity within the Church. For example, in some places, the iconostasis is a rather high, solid wall, consisting of several rows of icons; in other places, the iconostasis is low, perhaps only one or maybe two rows high. The important thing is that the icons are properly displayed and employed and venerated; of secondary—and here quite inconsequential—importance is how many rows any given iconostasis may or may not have. Another example: Among many Catholic churches there is a custom of blessing food in conjunction with the celebration of Holy Pascha; in other places this practice is unknown. This does not indicate a "difference" in anything essential in the faith or in the life of the Church; rather, it is an expression of Paschal joy developed in some places for specific reasons but perhaps not in others. In no way does the blessing of Paschal food, or the lack thereof, make one's celebration "better" or "worse." What is critical—and what is absolutely the same among all Catholic Christians—is the centrality of the celebration of the Holy Pascha, the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. Blessing food may be a wonderful aspect of this celebration, but it surely is not essential to obtaining eternal life.

The desire to be a pilgrim is deeply rooted in human nature. Since the earliest times, pilgrimages to holy places have been made as acts of devotion, penance or thanksgiving, or to seek blessings or miracles. A pilgrimage is a sacred journey in which God is encountered through the places, people and situations a pilgrim meets. This physical journey coincides with an inner spiritual journey that reflects the concept of life itself as a pilgrimage.

This year, Sisters Servants of Mary Immaculate, joyfully announce that His Beatitude, Patriarch Sviatoslav Shevchuk will preside at the 64th Holy Dormition Pilgrimage in Sloatsburg, NY on August 11-12, 2018. His Eminence Timothy Cardinal Dolan will also be an honorable guest and main celebrant.

Our parish will have a bus to go to the Pilgrimage on SUNDAY, AUGUST 12. We will be able to participate at the Pontifical Divine Liturgy at 10:30 a.m., receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation and Blessing of the Sick. We will also pray the Stations of the Cross and the Moleben to the Mother of God at 3:30 p.m. The bus will leave from the front of the church at 8:00 a.m. and after completion of all services at 5:00 p.m. return to Perth Amboy. The tickets for the bus are \$20 for an adult person and the money will be collected on the bus. Bus seating is limited and will be assigned on a first come, first serve basis.

Bishop Andriy Rabyi to Lead Pilgrims at Assumption Church, Centralia, Pa.

All are invited to join Bishop Andriy Rabyi and clergy on a Pilgrimage at the Church of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary in Centralia, Pa. on Sunday, August 26th. The pilgrimage begins at 12:00 noon with the celebration of the Divine Liturgy with Bishop Andriy as the main celebrant. Bishop Ronald Gainer will give a reflection and lead the praying of a Living Rosary at 2:00 PM before the historic and jeweled 18th century copy of the Icon of Our Lady of Pochaiv. At 3:00 PM Akafist to the Mother of God will be sung. At 4:30 PM a candlelight procession to the church for the celebration of a Moleben to the Mother of God with Bishop Andriy as main celebrant and homilist. At the conclusion of the Moleben, prayers for healing and the anointing with holy oils for the healing of soul and body will take place.

Confessions will be available throughout the day at various locations on the church grounds. There will be religious goods for sale, which will be blessed at the conclusion of the Living Rosary in the outdoor chapel. Food service will be provided from 1:00 PM until 4:00 PM.

This is a Rain or Shine event. Handicap parking will be provided on the church grounds.
