Following last week's Sunday Liturgy, light refreshments were provided by the Ukrainian National Womens League of America Branch 135. The event helped to raise funds to help the innocent victims of war in Ukraine. The continued war in Ukraine is causing extreme civilian harm and leaving millions without access to food, water and other essential supplies.

At the event, representing the U.S. Committee for Ukrainian Holodomor-Genocide Awareness, Mrs. Maria Flynn explained that while some countries have recognized Holodomor as a genocide, the Congress of the United States of America has not done that yet.

- She requested the support of the Ukrainian community in petitioning the Pulitzer Prize Board to revoke Duranty's undeserved prize for not truthful reporting the Soviet genocide-famine of 1933.
- And also, in commemoration of the 90th anniversary of the Ukrainian Holodomor, the U.S. Committee for Ukrainian Holodomor-Genocide

Religious Education for the Parish Youth.

Teenagers up to 13 years old gathered in the convent, where our religious sisters spoke to them about the meaning of life and the way to happiness offered by Jesus Christ, and Fr. Ivan emphasized that each human life is endowed with a spiritual and immortal soul, intelligence, and free will. Many new children came to this gathering for the first time. Everyone was happy to get to know each other, to talk, to meet old friends, to make new ones, to see each other's favorite dishes (the most popular being varenyky, no matter whether the children were born in Ukraine or in America) and sports. Last Sunday, for the second time, the young adults over 18 years old met in the convent of the sisters. This time the theme of the meeting was the heroic generation, that is, young people who are called to follow Christ heroically in spite of the modern ideas of the world, without betraying His teachings, and to live virtuously as He did in the midst of such widespread selfishness. The young people shared their thoughts and observations. As examples served the martyrs-seminarians of the 20th century and a young fallen soldier from the group of youth of the sisters in Ukraine. In a friendly and joyful atmosphere, everyone talked, got to know each other better, played a game and had a good time together.
