LITURGICAL NOTES ABOUT THE PASCHAL SEASON

Resurrection of Christ is the celebration of our faith. It is a proof of the divine nature of our Lord Jesus Christ. It is our great hope that as Christ has risen from the dead, so will anyone, who believes in Him and follows His commandments will rise again and live forever in the heavenly realm.

The Holy Church is the place where each of us prepares for the eternal life and strengthens his faith for the day of the Universal Resurrection.

This period of great festivity and joy finds its liturgical expression in the following manner:

- We great each other with the Paschal salutation, "Christ is risen! Indeed He is risen!" for 40 days, until Ascension Day.
- ❖ We do not kneel or make prostrations either at church services or in our homes until the "Kneeling Prayers" at Pentecost.
- ❖ The Paschal Troparion, "Christ is risen from the dead" is sung or said at the beginning or end of all prayers until the Leave-taking of Pascha on the Eve of Ascension.
- ❖ The prayer, "O Heavenly King" is omitted until Pentecost, being replaced with the Troparion of Pascha and then Ascension.



At the conclusion of today's Divine Liturgies, as is the custom in our Ukrainian Catholic Church, the faithful will receive a special blessing through the anointing of one's forehead with Holy Oil.

The priest will greet you with either, "Xpucmoc Bockpec!" or "Christ is Risen!", to which one responds: "Boicmuну Bocкpec!" or "Indeed He is Risen!"

Easter Egg Hunt.

Last Sunday, following the Liturgy, the children from our parish joined in to find a reported over 1000 eggs that were prepared by men from the Holy Name Society. It was a blast! The children had a great time hunting for eggs filled by Assumption School Students with goodies such as coins and candies. From the looks of things, everyone had a great time, and not just the kids either, the parents and grandparents and families had fun just watching.

ARTOS Bread.

The most important of all the Paschal Foods that we bless on this Feast of Feasts is the Resurrection Bread, still called by its Greek name "Artos". This loaf is baked with an icon of the Resurrection etched into the dough or set on top of it. This bread represents the Risen Christ, the True Bread of Life. Followers of Judaism eat unleavened bread on Passover to symbolize the rush in which they had to prepare the food for their original Passover.

The Christian Pascha (which means "Passover") calls for Christians to bless this special loaf of leavened bread because Christ's Resurrection raises all creation, just as yeast raises the dough in bread. Indeed, all creations shares in His Resurrection. The Artos is blessed today at the end of the Liturgy.

Next Sunday, on St. Thomas Sunday, it is distributed to all the gathered faithful. At this service, the priest hands a piece of the Artos to all the faithful. This Artos reminds us that Christ, the True Bread of Life, has served as the Paschal (Passover) Lamb which was slain and sacrificed for our sins, giving us freedom from sin and death, which had held humanity captive since the sin of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden.
