## LITURGICAL NOTES ABOUT THE PASCHAL SEASON

This period of great festivity and joy finds its liturgical expression in the following manner:

♦ We great each other with the Paschal salutation, "Christ is risen! Indeed He is risen!" for 40 days, until Ascension Day.

♦ Starting today, the Feast of Pascha, and continuing until Pentecost Sunday (even throughout the week), we do not kneel during the Divine Liturgy. Kneeling is a sign of penance and contrition - but the joy of Pascha is so much greater in this season that we stand in celebration instead.

♦ Please remember that during Bright Week (Sunday of Pascha to the Sunday of St. Thomas), there is no fasting at all. Bright Week is seen, liturgically speaking, as one single day - a continuation of Pascha throughout the whole week

#### Sviachene - Easter Dinner.

We are happy to announce that our annual Parish Easter Dinner/Sviachene will be held in the school hall on Sunday, May 4, 2025 following a 10:00 AM Divine Liturgy. As in the past, only one liturgy will be held that Sunday. The dinner will consist of traditional Easter food, such as ham, kobasa, eggs, paska, cold salads, beets with horseradish, etc. Tickets are available the Sunday after Easter (April 27, last day to purchase) in the church vestibule and at coffee hour, or during office hours at the rectory. The cost is minimal, \$20 per adult, children \$10, complimentary under 5 years old. Ticket at the door will cost \$30.

#### WHAT IS BRIGHT WEEK?

Bright Week is the first week following the Resurrection of Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, which is celebrated each year at Pascha. It ends the following Sunday, the Sunday of St. Thomas. For all Eastern Christians Bright Week begins a period of celebration that continues for fifty days until Pentecost. This celebration includes the practice of the faithful joyously greeting each other with the salutation of Christ is risen, followed by the response indeed He is risen or truly He is risen, as the whole of creation is renewed by Our Lord and Savior. The services of Bright Week are done with the Royal Doors fully open. This unblocked view of the altar symbolizes the open door of Christ's empty tomb as well as the rent veil of the Jewish Temple, which was torn apart at the moment Christ died. The entire week is considered to be one continuous day and the main reason why fasting is completely prohibited to all Eastern Christians during the week.

## Warm Traditions Rise with the Scent of Paska.

The comforting aroma of freshly baked bread drifts through the air at Assumption Ukrainian Catholic Church in Perth Amboy, NJ, signaling a beloved seasonal tradition in full swing. Inside the small but bustling church kitchen, volunteers work in harmony to create paska —a traditional Ukrainian Easter bread rich in symbolism and flavor.

Under the guidance of Mrs. Colette Baginsky, a dedicated team of helpers—John, Alla, Lisa, Mary, Robert, and Elizabeth—move with practiced ease through their tasks. Dough is mixed, shaped, and carefully placed into pans as warm trays emerge from the oven, their golden loaves filling the room with fragrance and pride. Over the course of two days, the team will craft over 100 paskas and 90 smaller loaves, continuing a cherished ritual that brings the community together in both faith and friendship. In each loaf lies not only the taste of Easter but also the spirit of shared heritage and love.

The funds raised from the Paska sale will be used to purchase a new Ukrainian Gospel book for the altar.

## <u>Lenten Retreat Day.</u>

As part of their Lenten journey, ACS welcomed students, teachers, principals, and pastors from St. Nicholas Ukrainian Catholic Schools in Minersville, PA, and Passaic, NJ for a day-long retreat. The event was led by Fr. Jonathan Kalisch, OP, Director of Chaplains and Spiritual Development for the Knights of Columbus.
