#### 19th Sunday after Pentecost Gospel.

Jesus tells the parable of a sower who scatters seed some falls on the path, some on rocky ground, some among thorns, and some on good soil. The seed, He explains, is the Word of God, and the soil represents the human heart that receives it. The Word That Gives Life Christ, the Divine Sower, never stops sowing. His Word is generous, abundant, and constant. Yet the fruit depends not on the sower but on the soil of the soul-on how open we are to receive His

St. John Chrysostom reminds us: "The fault is not in the sower, but in the ground where the seed falls."

If our hearts are hard, distracted, or shallow, the Word cannot take root. But when we listen with humility and perseverance, God's grace bears fruit-thirty, sixty, or a hundredfold.

## An Overview of the Ukrainian Catholic Church

The Ukrainian Catholic Church is in full communion with the Universal Catholic Church of Rome yet has its own rite, that is, distinctive liturgies, services, hymns, and prayers. Our Liturgy follows the time-honored, deeply spiritual and symbolic Orthodox Christian traditions of the Eastern or Byzantine Rite (as opposed to the more readily recognized Latin or Roman Rite) of the Catholic Church and remains essentially unchanged since the early centuries of the Christian Faith. There is a heavy emphasis on choral and congregations singing; often our entire Liturgy is sung.

We worship God in the Holy Trinity; we glorify the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit equally. We believe that the Lord Jesus Christ is the Son of God and that He is one in being with the Father. We also believe that Jesus was conceived by the Holy Spirit, and born of a Virgin. He was crucified for the sins of the whole world and rose from the grave to grant eternal life. The Universal Church affirms that all Catholics meet all their obligations in the Eastern Church and are welcome to participate in Communion.

#### Know Your Church... Elements of the Liturgy

#### **Antiphons**

Sometimes a fixed refrain is added after each verse of a psalm. In the Old Testament, some psalms already come in this form, with refrains like "for His mercy endures forever!" or "Alleluia! (a Hebrew word meaning "Praise God!").

In the Byzantine tradition, these short refrains were called troparia; here are some examples:

Through the prayers of your saints, O Savior, save us! O Son of God, risen from the dead, save us who sing to you: Alleluia! Save your people, O Lord, and bless your inheritance! Holy God, Holy and Mighty, Holy and Immortal, have mercy on us!

An antiphon consists of a set of psalm verses, with each one followed by the fixed refrain, then the small doxology ("Glory to the Father... Now and ever..."), and the refrain once more; this was usually followed by a short litany and a prayer. An "office" of three such antiphons was an ancient feature of the Byzantine Rite. Today, these antiphons are sung in the Divine Liturgy.
